Then we'll use one strategy, Say/Mean/Matter, to determine what each one says, what it means, why it matters, and to whom it matters. Appendix C of the Common Core Standards offers samples of student writing that meet Common Core State Standards. The authors list what these students are able to do in their writing. We as teachers need to hone our own abilities in analyzing student writing and in noticing what our students have already achieved. But we don't stop there. We go another step and guide students to enhance their writing. Participants will analyze students' second-to-final drafts and craft comments that both acknowledge strengths and pose questions to help them revise.
